NeroLinux 3 unveiled at CeBIT

Remember [Nero Burning ROM](#)? Of course you do, it's that beautiful application for Windows which helps you burn your everyday CDs and DVDs. Well, on Linux systems, Nero Burning ROM (NeroLinux) is not that popular because there are many other native CD/DVD burning applications out there, like the award winning K3b, [which recently released version 1.0](#), or GnomeBaker, Brasero and many others, and because it's not free software.
